Don't know your EIRCODE?

To get it, click on this link www.eircode.ie then click on 'Find an Eircode' and either type in your address or click on 'Use my Location'. Your eircode will then appear on your screen.

Your home has been built to very high standards with solar panels fitted on the roof of your house or apartment block to generate electricity. These solar panels will run constantly and generate electricity when there is enough sunlight, without you needing to adjust any controls. The amount of electricity generated will vary from day to day and throughout the year, with more electricity being generated during the spring and summer months.

How your solar panels work

Solar panels convert sunlight into electricity. This electricity is automatically used in your home to run appliances, lighting, and any electrical equipment and replaces some of the electricity you would otherwise have to purchase from your electricity supplier. And to make best use of your system the basic rule is if the suns shining that's the best time to charge your devices, run the washing machine or other electrical appliances. This system will therefore save you money. As sunlight

varies each day and throughout the year the solar panels will only ever contribute to your electricity use and you will still have electricity charges from your electricity supplier.

What else do you need to know

- During any interruption to your electricity supply your solar panels will stop working, it's a Health and Safety requirement. This means that if you have a pre-pay electricity meter your solar panels will not work during any periods when you run out of credit. You should therefore ensure that you have credit on your electricity meter so you are able to get the full benefit of your solar panels.
- No electrical work should be carried out to your home without Comhar Housing giving permission and in the event that any electrical contractor is working in your home they need to be advised that solar panels are present.
- Comhar Housing is responsible for maintaining your solar panels and any related equipment in your

home. If you believe your system is not working, or you require any further information on the solar panels at your home, please contact Comhar Housing on 01-6964570

 The solar panels on your roof provide electricity for some, or all, of your electricity needs. Any unused surplus electricity spills onto the electricity grid. This means that you may be entitled to receive credits on your account for this spilled electricity. This is called the 'Feed-in Tariff' - We recommend you contact your electricity provider to see if you are entitled to this credit.

Spring Clean

With the days lengthening and the weather warming, now is a good time to tackle some of those spring cleaning jobs we all put on the long finger, both inside and outside your home.

Get cleaning:

- Your cooking hood filters and make a plan to clean them often.

- Apply an acid-free oil, Vaseline, or a silicone lubricant to the moving parts.
